From the Tower

As I was leaving having rung a quarter peal, a member of the congregation asked about what we had just been ringing. On this occasion it was a quarter peal to celebrate the arrival of Liz's new grandson, Remy. Ringers are always looking for an excuse to ring quarter peals - but you might wonder what one is.

A peal is made up of all the different changes (orders of the bells) that can be rung on seven bells – that's 7 factorial, or 5040. We have only six bells so we need to ring each change 7 times to reach the required number for a peal or 42 times if we ring on five bells with a tenor "cover"). Peals take about 3 hours to ring and only the most dedicated ringers ring lots of them!

Quarter peals are far more manageable, but still a significant challenge for an inexperienced ringer. As you might guess they are only a quarter of the length, so 1260 changes. On our bells this takes about 40 minutes.

Where this is leading is that we would like to invite you to request a quarter peal. Perhaps you, or someone you know, has a significant birthday or anniversary, or maybe you would like a half-muffled quarter in memory of a loved one. All we ask is a donation to Church funds. You are welcome to come along and listen. Why not try and count the number of times an individual bell rings?
